## Grace and Peace to You from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ.

Thank you to all who completed the Farming Church inventory. We have our results back and the council has already gotten to work. I wrote back in June, but I know there are more questions out there.

What is "farming church"? Farming Church is a two-year process which enhances a congregation's capacity to accept change. Change is coming, and we do not know what it will be (that's up to the Holy Spirit). But if we are not ready, we won't be able to follow God's will.

What does the process look like? First, a congregation takes an inventory to gauge its position in 7 key categories that mark a congregation's readiness for change—faith, trust, vision, leadership, urgency, discovery, alignment. A score from 1-3 demonstrates a congregation hesitant to embrace change. A score from 4-6 demonstrates a congregation which may have some ambivalence to change. A score from 7-10 marks a congregation that is eager to embrace change.

Next, the leadership of the congregation (council) takes a look at one of the 7 areas to get a better understanding of what one of those categories is all about. For example, last month we looked at faith. The faith of a congregation has to do with its worship experience, its education opportunities, and its members own spiritual practices.

Once the leadership has an idea about that practice, the pastor and the council president go through a coaching session via teleconference with a consultant from Pinnacle Associates. This is to help them lead the next leadership session. Then the

leadership all comes together again to figure some ways that the faith of the congregation might increase. After that, changes may be implemented throughout the congregation.

How did we do? Overall and in each measure, we were consistently in the high 6's. Just under the mark from falling into the "eager" zone. To me, this was a great spot to be. I think it shows where we want to be and yet maintaining a healthy but small amount of skepticism. That's probably just pure prudence with a new process that is not well understood. It also means that we are in a position where the changes we will make will not be drastic or radical ones.

So what changes are being made? We have already been making tweaks to our But the biggest change is worship service. that we are attempting to get field education student this year from LTSS. This will be a big thing. We've not had any new worship leadership in a long time. It also means that we will be a teaching congregation. current situation at the seminary means it is at the congregation where a seminarian learns how to lead worship. Your part in that will be to a supportive, welcoming and encouraging place. So if this unfolds (the seminary is not certain of the number of incoming students), I am asking you to let me be the voice of instruction and critique. We will also be asking our communion assistants to help pray the prayers of the people.

With regard to education, read the back cover to get an idea. I'm wanting to keep it under wraps for a bit, but I'm really excited about this opportunity. And regarding spiritual practices, I need you all to let me know about interest in a monthly (?) prayer breakfast.

That's a lot of info. I think my biggest request of you at this time is just to pray for your church leadership. We are taking on a fairly large amount of extra work, so your prayerful support will be a blessing.

### **COMMEMORATION PROFILES**

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



### September 2 Nikolai Frederik Severin Grundtvig, Bishop (1783-1872) Renewer of the Church

Nikolai Grundtvig, a nineteenth-century Danish theologian, had strong views about returning the church to Lutheran orthodoxy, centering on the Apostles' Creed and the sacraments. He was also an authority on Norse and Anglo-Saxon sagas and wrote poetry, including a Danish version of Beowulf. Lutherans know Grundtvig as the author of hymn texts such as "O Day Full of Grace" and "Built on a Rock."

# September 9 Peter Claver, (1581-1654) Priest, Missionary to Columbia

Born into Spanish nobility, Peter Claver was persuaded to become a Jesuit missionary to the New World. In 1610 he began ministering to Africans brought on slave ships to South America. Not only did Claver give them food, clothing, and medicine as soon as they debarked, but he also helped them after they were taken to plantations or mines. He learned the Africans' languages in order to teach them about Christ. Peter Claver reportedly baptized 300,000 slaves during his 33 years as a missionary.

### September 16 Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage (c. 200- c. 258) Martyr

A native of North Africa, Cyprian became a Christian at age 46, was ordained a priest, and became the bishop at Carthage soon after that. He had to care for his fellow Christians in covert ways because of persecution by imperial authorities. Cyprian believed strongly in the need for unity in the church, so he urged compassion for those Christians who had compromised their faith under pressure from Rome. In 258, when Cyprian was asked to renounce his own Christianity, his refusal led to his beheading.

September 30 Jerome, (c. 347-420) translator, teacher

Jerome was a priest and scholar of the early church. After his baptism in Rome at age 19, he traveled widely on pilgrimages and continued to study, learning Hebrew as one of his endeavors. After admission to the priesthood, he received a papal commission to translate the Bible into Latin. Jerome's translation, known as the Vulgate, served as the standard Latin version for 15 centuries after its completion.



### HAH, HAH

During a Sunday school lesson, a child learned about how God created human beings. The child became especially focused when the teacher explained how Eve was created from Adam's ribs. Later on in the week, the boy's mother saw him lying down on the floor, so she asked him what was wrong. His reply was priceless: "Mom, I have a pain in my side—I think I'm getting a wife."


