
Grace and Peace to You from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ.

If you thought things were both culturally and politically disturbing in the US in 2018, I'm sorry to say 2019 seems to be following the same pace and direction so far. Perhaps the most surreal moment to date was watching the galley of the New York State Legislature cheer the passing of a bill that expands abortion by removing the 24 week limit, expanding the reasons for late-term abortion from the mother's life to the mother's life or health, and expanding the types of medical personnel who can perform abortions. While the pro-choice people applaud it, and the pro-life people denounce it, to me it just seems so extreme. There is no compromise in bill like that. Later, New York Governor Andrew Cuomo signed the bill into law.

I do not speak about abortion much for a few reasons. We live in a culture that frowns on men speaking on the matter (unless it's a full-throated embrace of the pro-choice position). Secondly, I don't have any first hand experience on the matter (although I know that many readers will have been involved or adjacent to decisions involvement regarding the surrounding abortion). Thirdly, since I don't talk about it often, there is a high chance I would talk about abortion in a clumsy, unproductive manner. So I operate believing that, in America, the best-cast-scenario would be the politician's quote that abortion ought to be "legal, safe, and rare". If I had to deal with the issue pastorally, I would do all I could to dissuade an abortion. Others would be working on "legal and safe"; I would be working on "rare" when I could.

And as she tells it, time and time again, she mentions forgiveness.

It's a sure sign that a thing will create feelings of guilt and shame if it can be screamed about in Washington marches, but when it needs to be talked about in real life it must be spoken in hushed So how can we talk about tones. Well, I'll never be a NY abortion? legislator. I'm not likely to see a day when the debate is settled. But for those who are burdened with guilt and shame, I can speak of God's forgiveness in Christ Jesus. I can speak about abortion that way.

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



February 3 Ansgar, Bishop of Hamburg Missionary to Denmark and Sweden (801-865)

Ansgar was born near Amiens. France. After his mother's early death, he was sent to join a monastery. subsequent life as a monk, Ansgar became missionary first Christian the His appointment as an Scandinavia. archbishop gave him much-needed funding and a base of operations for his difficult work. Just before his death, Ansgar asked his friends not to abandon the mission to Nordic countries, but two centuries passed before Christianity was able to gain ground Today's Swedish Lutherans, in there. particular, hold Ansgar in high regard.

February 5 The Martyrs of Japan (died 1597)

Catholic, Episcopal, and Lutheran churches have chosen to remember, each February 5, the crucifixion of twenty-six Christians in Nagasaki, Japan. These sixteenth-century men of faith were six Franciscan missionaries sent from Europe, a Japanese Jesuit priest, a Korean layman, fifteen Japanese laymen three and young boys. Despite the virtual banishment of Christianity from Japan bν missionaries who entered the country in the mid-1800's found a community of Christians there that had survived by hiding its faith and worship.

February 18 Martin Luther, Renewer of the church (1483-1546)

Founder of the Protestant Reformation. Martin Luther formulated а new understanding of humanity's relationship with God. He recognized Jesus as the only mediator between mankind and God; he identified grace as the key element in forgiveness and salvation; and for him, word and sacrament were the key elements of worship. Luther's translation of the Bible from churchly Latin into everyday German was a tremendous gift to Christianity and culture in Germany. His catechisms, tracts, letters, sermons and hymns remain powerful sources of education and inspiration for Christians around the world today.
