Grace and Peace to you from God our Father and Our Lord, Jesus Christ!

Many (not ALL) of us have a strange relationship with the whole idea of evangelism—that is, sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ. Here in the American South, Evangelism walks hand-inhand with giving a personal testimony. I'm certainly NOT opposed to giving a personal testimony, but I have noticed that they often are not so personal and follow a particular script. One of our members once told me about attending a Christian group at her high school years ago as a sophomore. Her friend was to give a testimony that day and he began by saying that last year (their freshman year) he was hanging around with "bad crowd". It made for a fine testimony, but all she could think was "you hung around *us* last year, bucko!"

Sharing the good news with people can even be dicey in today's culture. In his book, *Evangelism for "Normal" People*, John Bowen recalls a story from writer Sandra Tsing Loh. In this story, she and her recently new boyfriend, Jeff, asks her in the midst of an ordinary date with absolute seriousness, "Have you accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as your savior?" She follows up, "Just like that. No warm-up. No mood music. No idle teasing around the God issue to loosen the soil. Had Jeff [suddenly groped me] I would not have been more shocked." I think Jeff made it pretty quickly to recently new ex-boyfriend status.

I was pleased with the informal results of the Farming Church Vision sessions. In all four sessions, there were a lot of consistent ideas. Your leadership needs to sort through it more and make some decisions, but I'll have more to talk about this later. But one recurring theme is (and I'm using my own words



MAINTENANCE UPDATE

After approving 4 items for Building Maintenance back in early June, work is well underway.

Roofing—The roof has been repaired where needed, gutters added, and the shingled roof over the fellowship hall has already been replaced. Custom Roofing of Columbia performed that work.

Lighting—at the writing of this article, the lights over the pews have been replaced with high efficiency and matching bulbs throughout. In some cases, 500 W bulbs were replaced with bulbs that operate around 5 Watts! The lights over the choir loft are still to be replaced (tricky to get a ladder where needed), and the lights that shine onto organ pipes were discovered to be a very dated lighting technology. our Contractor is working on that. They will also be instructed to look at options for the fallen light in the fellowship hall.

Painting—Exterior painting will begin in August.


Windows—Sheppard's Glass has repaired the window in the Bell Choir room. Work on the Sanctuary windows will be completed this summer.

How are we doing sharing the good news? There's room for improvement in all kinds of ways, but let me show you an interesting graphic that tells you we are sharing in ways that you won't even suspect. Some of you know that I put my sermons online. You can access them through the church Facebook page or my blog page (https://gointhismightofyours. blogspot.com/). Now probably only a few of you know that it costs us \$144/year to do that. Is it worth it? Well, here's a list of the listeners by country.



These aren't huge numbers by any stretch when it comes to having a presence on the worldwide web. But look, right here from 1500 Sunset Blvd in West Columbia, there have been listeners from South & Central America, Europe, and as far away as Iraq and India! The biggest single broadcast was from May 26, the 6th Sunday of Fifty-six people listened to that Easter. sermon online. Why? I have no But they did. Just to put that in clue. perspective, 57 people were in church that day. Is it worth it? YES!! It'll never likely mean a single person joining OSLC (although West Columbia provides the largest number of listeners, so who knows?) But it's worth it because with YOUR support and my preaching, the Good News of Jesus Christ is going all over the globe—from here. Frankly, I'm gobsmacked. The young women guests and first timers of the convention were given the task of performing a skit in front of everyone Saturday afternoon. I had a fun experience creating a skit with women who I got to know better. We were also given the task of helping out in the Worship Service which I was crucifer and worship assistant. Thank you for allowing me to attend the convention and learn more about the Women of the ELCA.

Beverly as 'delegate' on Friday

Representing Our Saviour at this year's WELCA Convention was a great experience! Although I have attended conventions in the past, it is still amazing to see what is embraced by this community of women! They support natural disasters, hunger, domestic violence, and families with special needs, just to name a few.

This year's theme of "Grace in Community" was demonstrated through support of Lighthouse for Life, by providing Freedom Bags (over 400!) for rescued survivors of human trafficking. Also "Grace in Community" was shown by signing "Thinking of You" and "Thank You for Your Service" cards to send to active duty military. "Grace in Community" will be far reaching as love is bestowed to people in need throughout South Carolina and the world. Another highlight of the convention was the workshop I attended on "Grace and Gratitude." It was especially enlightening to learn that showing gratitude greatly improves your physical health and your emotional status. Also giving gratitude is more rewarding than receiving it. Finally, I would like to encourage others to attend future WELCA conventions. It is a great opportunity to grow in faith, engage in ministry and action, and promote healing and wholeness in the church, society, and the world as you join other sisters in Christ.

Rebecca as 'delegate' on 'Saturday

Saturday at the WELCA convention included singing, business/voting and hearing from guest speakers. We were enlightened of the works of Lighthouse for Life by Jen Thompson. The journey to obtain and open a safe house for women who have been trapped in human trafficking. We also got to hear a moving testimony from a victim of human trafficking from here in S.C. Lighthouse for Life will continue their efforts to fight human trafficking by encouraging legislators to change and enforce stronger punishment for the 'buyers' of these victims. WELCA has made an impact by collecting and supplying 'freedom baas'. WELCA collected 428 backpacks this year alone. which was more than Lighthouse for Life gave away their first two years of operation. WELCA also contributed \$9,030.99 in checks and gift cards to support this cause. Lighthouse for Life hopes to open their safe house (Kari's House) in July of this year. In addition, WELCA collected approximately 2,056 cards for our service men and women. Representatives from the US Coast Guard and Air Force collected and will distribute the "Thank You for Your Service" cards. We closed our convention with a worship service and communion. Claire was one of two young women guests and was asked to participate in our worship service

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



July 28 Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750), Heinrich Schütz (1585-1672), and George Frederick Handel (1685-1759), musicians

The Christian church owes much to these composers of German descent whose lives are commemorated on July The earliest of them, Heinrich 28. Schütz, has been called the greatest German composer of his century. In biblical texts set to music for choirs, he composed so as to underscore the meaning of important words. Heinrich Schütz is represented in our hymnal by #573 ("My Soul Now Magnifies the Lord"), whose melody has been paired by a twentieth-century writer with the Magnificat, Mary's words upon hearing the angel's announcement to her. which appear in the Gospel of Luke.

Bach and Handel were contemporaries, but they never met. While Bach performed and composed in Weimar and Leipzig, creating cantatas (about two hundred) and other compositions which proclaim the Gospel through music, Handel worked in Italy and England and never returned to his German homeland. In our ELW, the eight hymns related to Bach are among his many arrangements of earlier chorale melodies, whose composers include Heinrich Isaac (1450-1517) and Hans Leo Hassler (1564-1612). Only one of ELW's hymns, #376, contains music composed by Handel. It is the familiar Easter hymn, "Thine Is the Glory," and its tune is from the oratorio Judas Maccabaeus. Handel's compositions are not church music in the strictest sense, but Messiah and other oratorios of his are scriptural retellings on a grand scale

7 SURPRISING TRENDS IN GLOBAL CHRISTIANITY IN 2019

Instead of evaluating Christianity based on a local or even national perspective, a global vantage point can provide a better picture of the status of the faith.

The Center for the Study of Global Christianity at Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary regularly publishes the <u>Status of Global</u> <u>Christianity</u>. Evaluating their research and predictions provides an encouraging and potential surprising picture for the current and future state of Christianity.

1. Christianity is growing faster than the population.

Globally, Christianity is growing at a 1.27% rate. Currently, there are 2.5 billion Christians in the world. The world's population, 7.7 billion, is growing at a 1.20% rate.

Islam (1.95%), Sikhs (1.66%) and Hindus (1.30%) are the only religious groups growing faster than Christianity, though followers of Jesus outnumber every other faith and are predicted to continue to do so at least through 2050.

2. Pentecostals and Evangelicals are growing the fastest and are still picking up speed.

Among Christian groups, Pentecostals (2.26%) and evangelicals (2.19%) are growing faster than others. They are both also growing faster than they did just two years ago. In 2017, Pentecostals' growth rate was 2.22% and evangelicals was 2.12%.

3. Atheism has peaked.

There are fewer atheists in the world today (138 million) than there were in 1970 (165 million). Since 2000, atheism has rebounded slightly—only by 0.04%—but it is expected to decline again and fall below 130 million by 2050.

Agnosticism has maintained a small growth rate of 0.42%. After reaching 716 million this year, however, it is expected to drop below 700 million by 2050.

4. Christianity is growing in cities, but not fast enough.

Today, 1.64 billion Christians live in urban areas, growing at a 1.58% rate since 2000.

But more than 55% of the world's population lives in cities and that is only continuing to grow. The global urban population is growing at a 2.15% rate.

5. The center of Christianity has moved to the global south.

In 1900, twice as many Christians lived in Europe than in the rest of the world combined. Today, both Latin America and Africa have more. By 2050, the number of Christians in Asia will also pass the number in Europe.

Currently, Christianity is barely growing in Europe (0.04% rate) and only slightly better in North America (0.56%).

Oceania (0.89) and Latin America (1.18%) have marginally better rates, but the faith is exploding in Asia (1.89%) and Africa (2.89%).

6. There are more evangelism opportunities for Christians than ever.

The vast majority of non-Christians live their lives and never interact with a Christian, but that number is shrinking.

In 1900, only 5.5% of non-Christians knew a Christian. Today, that has grown to 18.3%.

Obviously, that number is still too small, but the growing percentage grants more non-Christians the opportunity to hear the gospel from someone they know.

7. The percentage of the unevangelized is shrinking.

More than half of the world's population in 1900 (54.3%) were unevangelized. That percentage continues to shrink, dropping to 28.4% in 2019.

That still means, however, that almost 2.2 billion people living today are still considered unevangelized.
