Grace and Peace to you from God our Father and Our Lord, Jesus Christ!

I came across something interesting in my reading while preparing for Vacation Bible School. We were going to be talking about the Blessed Virgin Mary and I wanted to make sure the class understood that, as Lutherans, we have a good understanding about how we treat Mary and all the other Saints. The Twenty-first Article of the Augsburg Confession titled "Concerning the Cult of Saints" is our go-to reference for that. So I looked it up.

Now Charles V, Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire, had a problem. Luther's teachings had been gaining traction over the past decade and the split between the Roman Catholics and the then-called Evangelical Church was creating a problem of disunity in the Empire. And Charles V did not need a divided Empire. He was fighting off the invading Ottoman Empire, and he needed a united Empire to do it well. So he called the Catholics and the Evangelicals (that's what the early Reformers called themselves) together so that the Evangelicals could present in a formal way what it is they really believe. His hope was that the differences might get ironed out in some way. (They didn't.)

So in their presentation on the Saints, the Evangelicals said, "Concerning the cult of saints [our churches] teach that saints may be remembered in order that we imitate their faith and good works according to our calling. Thus, the emperor can imitate the example of David in waging war to drive the Turks [Ottoman Empire] from our native land."

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



August 11 Clare, Abbess of San Damiano (1194-1253)

Born into the Italian nobility, Clare rejected two offers of marriage, choosing instead a life of poverty and piety. It was after St. Francis preached in her home town that Clare, at age eighteen, left her family to seek a less worldly life. Francis found a refuge for her with Benedictine nuns, and soon Clare helped to establish a new Franciscan women's community near the church of San Damiano in Assisi. The new order, known as The Order of Poor Ladies, or The Poor Clares, was devoted to prayer and austerity. The pope gave the Clares permission to live entirely on alms given to them, with no property of their own. Clare led them resolutely for forty years and inspired other women of her time to lives of religious devotion.

August 14 Maximilian Kolbe, martyr (1894-1941)

Son of poor Catholic parents in Russianoccupied Poland, Raymond Kolbe entered a Franciscan seminary at age sixteen and took the name Maximillian. Further studies Rome led to his ordination as a priest in 1918. Father Kolbe returned to Poland to teach at a seminary, and in 1927 he founded a monastery near Warsaw on land donated by a Polish prince. In the 1930's Father Kolbe established another monastery in Nagasaki, Japan, which survived World War Ш and still serves as a Franciscan center. After the Nazi invasion of Poland. Father Kolbe and his fellow Franciscans sheltered refugees. manv of them Jews. The Nazis arrested Father Kolbe in 1941, imprisoned him in Warsaw, and later moved him to Auschwitz. Following a prisoner's escape in July, 1941, the concentration camp authorities ordered ten be starved to death men to in retaliation. When one of those, a married man with children, pleaded for mercy, Father Kolbe volunteered to take his place among the ten. After several weeks of starvation, he was executed by lethal injection. Pope John Paul II's official declaration of Father Kolbe's sainthood was witnessed by the man whose life he had saved at Auschwitz.

August 14 Kaj Munk, martyr (1898-1944)

Orphaned at age six, Kaj Munk was adopted by Christians who made sure that he got a good education. He became a Danish Lutheran pastor and served a very small parish, but his influence spread throughout Scandinavia. In his plays, sermons, and patriotic writings, Munk predicted the victory of Christian faith over adversity. The Danish resistance movement circulated his writings to encourage opposition to Hitler. The Nazis arrested Munk in 1944, and he was found shot to death soon after. His martyrdom only added to the determination of those resisting German aggression.

Located in the Lineberger Memorial Library at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, the Crumley

Archives is the official repository for historical records for the ELCA in the southeastern U.S. We hold materials in twenty languages dating back to the 1500s, representing thirteen generations of worshiping Lutherans.

Our collection is among the largest non-government archives in South Carolina. It holds over 3,500 cubic feet of records related to Southern and Caribbean Lutheran synods, churches, other organizations, ministers and church staff. In addition to paper collections of manuscripts, reports, blueprints and other materials, we also have microfilm, photographs, artifacts, and various forms of multimedia.



If you are a southeastern Lutheran looking for cool old stuff, please feel free to call us and make an appointment. We are on the road a lot, looking for new additions for our collection, so appointments have proven to work best.
