Grace and peace to you from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

In our Farming Church work on vision, several themes were repeated. We haven't ironed it all out yet, but it was obvious that this congregation believes that God has blessed us with a wonderful location and excellent facilities. And it was also revealed that we need to be using our facility more as a center within our own community.

Now remember that all this Farming Church work is based on the Parable of the Seed Growing in Secret as found in Mark 4. It reads: *[Jesus] also said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."*

The interpretation of this parable is that, as disciples seeking the Kingdom of God, our role is two-fold—planting seed and harvesting. The work we've done with Farming Church is akin to the seed scattering. So then we let God do his work and wait for the harvest time to come.

Some of the harvest has come.

We've been hosting the Saluda Gardens Neighborhood Association as they are getting a reboot. They will be hosting a craft fair in December as well as using OSLC for its community meetings. So far its been a good way to get people visiting and an even better way to use our facilities for the good of the community.

For 12 weeks, on Wednesdays, an organization called *Classical Conversations* will be using our facilities. *Classical Conversations* is an organization that home schooling families from across the Columbia area come together for a full school day and go over a curriculum. Marie and I visited where they currently meet and found it to be a solid program with a school day that start in assembly that includes prayer and afterward they break into smaller classes. It is attended by over 40 children and probably 20 parents. *Classical Conversations* will be compensating us for utilities and water, and we will evaluate how well this is working in May regarding Fall of 2020.

It will be important for us to remember this is a ministry, not an evangelism strategy. Most likely, every member of *Classical Conversations* is a practicing Christian with a church home. We are offering our space because they need it. I'm looking forward to the increased activity in our education wing and ask you warmly welcome them with your famous OSLC hospitality.

- Pastor Lance and Marie Lybrand will be meeting with the Classical Conversations Downtown Community on Wednesday, October 16 (homeschooling group requesting use of our facility beginning January, 2020).
- 2020 Budget--David presented the proposed 2020 Operating Budget in two forms.(see attached) The first budget included the Building Maintenance and Property Improvement Fund as part of the Operating Budget. The second budget excluded the Building Maintenance and Property Improvement Fund. After discussion, it was concluded that the Building Maintenance and Property Improvement fund should not be part of the Operating Budget. A budget for the Building Maintenance and Property Improvement Fund will be developed at a later date. Mark Satterwhite made a motion to remove the Building Maintenance and Property Improvement Fund from the Operating Budget. Bill Hill seconded; the motion passed. The proposed budget will be distributed via eVine and hard copies will also be available by October 18th.

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



November 3
Martin de Porres,
Renewer of society
(1579-1639)

Son of a Spanish knight and a freed slave from Panama, Martin apprenticed himself to a barber-surgeon in his hometown of Lima, Peru. While still a young man, Martin was accepted as a lay brother at a Dominican friary, where he continued to use his knowledge as a healer of the sick. Martin helped the poor, regardless of their race, and he had a deep love for animals. He founded an orphanage, a hospital, and a clinic for dogs and cats. For Catholics in the United States, Martin de Porres is considered the patron saint of work for interracial understanding and justice. On Hampton Street in Columbia there is a Catholic church/school complex which bears his name.

November 17
Elizabeth of Hungary,
Renewer of society
(1207-1231)

Daughter of Hungary's King Andrew II, Elizabeth married Landgrave Louis IV of Thuringia at age fourteen, as part of a political alliance. She was happily married, as it turned out, so that when her husband died of the plague in 1227, she was heartbroken. She provided for her three children and then renounced the world on Good Friday, 1228, joining the third order of St. Francis. Her confessor, Conrad of Marburg, forced her to live a very harsh existence from then on, and she died at age twenty-four. She is remembered for the hospitals she founded with her husband and her lifelong devotion to the poor. Elizabeth is one of Germany's most beloved saints.

November 24
Justus Falckner,
Pastor in North America
(1672-1723)

Son of a German Lutheran pastor, Justus Falckner did not intend to follow his father's vocation. He did, however, study theology at the University of Halle. His older brother Daniel took Justus to America to be part of a real estate business. There, in Pennsylvania, Justus met several Swedish Lutheran pastors. In 1703 he became the first Lutheran pastor ordained in North America. Pastor Falckner served congregations in New York and New Jersey, authored the first Lutheran book on theology published in America, and wrote a number of hymns.

November 24
Jehu Jones,
Pastor in North America
(died 1852)

A native of Charleston, South Carolina, Jehu Jones was ordained by the New York Ministerium in 1832 after receiving a recommendation from John Bachman. Jones was a free black, and when he tried to return to South Carolina to join a mission delegation bound for Liberia, he was arrested. The law of the time prohibited free blacks from returning to the state after they had left it. Instead of Liberia, Pennsylvania became Jones' place of ministry. And so, the first African-American Lutheran pastor helped to found the first African-American Lutheran congregation, St. Paul's, in Philadelphia.

November 24
William Passavant,
Pastor in North America
(1821-1894)

A man of many accomplishments, Passavant received his formal training at Gettysburg Seminary in his home state of Pennsylvania. Upon his ordination in 1842, he became a pastor in Baltimore and joined the editorial staff of "Lutheran Observer." During a subsequent pastorate in Pittsburgh, he edited "The Missionary," which later became "The Lutheran." Passavant was instrumental in bringing deaconess work to the United States. He founded a number of hospitals and orphanages and raised funds effectively for their support. Passavant is also remembered as a founder of both Thiel College in Greenville, PA, and Lutheran Theological Seminary in Chicago.
