Grace and Peace to you from God our Father and the Lord, Jesus Christ!

Every year we talk about the three Lenten disciplines of almsgiving, prayer and fasting. And maybe every year you think you will participate in them in some sort of increased manner, and start, then get interrupted, then it doesn't work out, and you feel like a big Lenten loser. Well, let me give you some encouragement. There is nothing that says your Lenten disciplines each need to last the full 40 days. That perspective can lead us astray very quickly because it puts the focus on the discipline and not the benefit of the discipline.

Let's take a look at the three and, perhaps, we can understand them better.

ALMS GIVING

Ok, we do not pay or get paid with Alms. We use the good ol' USA dollar. But we then turn those dollars into stuff. And "stuff" is really what the alms giving discipline is really about. It is about our relationship with the material goods around us. In our baptism, we are asked to renounce the ways of sin that draw you away from God. How does stuff do Well, let's use an example of a pastor we all know. don't want to use his real name so we call him "Pastor Hance Lenderson". Pastor Hance took some vacation not too long ago to do some things around the house. It rained all week so he was forced to do inside stuff, like clean out his closet. He's lost some weight in the past years and hanging in his closet were two pairs of flannel lined pants that would fall off him today. He's known they were there, but never really thought about his homeless neighbor who could actually benefit from having warm pants. He's a decent enough fellow and if there had been some national crisis that needed flannel pants he would have gladly given to the cause, and he would have felt like a real hero. But that didn't happen. He just let some of fsfssafsd cont'd on page 2->

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useless-to-him stuff stay in his possession because he likes holding onto his "stuff". After all, it is *his*. Is that a sin?! Well, it's not exactly mass murder. But what is it we say every Sunday about "things done and things left undone"?

PRAYER

If alms giving is about our relationship with our stuff, prayer is about our relationship with our mental/emotional I hate to use the word "spiritual" because "spiritual" sounds too lofty. And what that's not really we talk about. Remember what Jesus says about the hypocrites praying loudly in the synagogues and street corners. were not looking for any sort of "spiritual" They wanted their stroked. They wanted to feel good about admiration having the their neighbors. They were looking to satisfy their mental/emotional selves. purpose of prayer is change the way we think and feel. For example, we might not be in the mood to be grateful. when we pray and start listing all the things we have that we can be grateful for, it suddenly makes our mind shift into true gratitude. That is one example of how your Father who sees your prayer in secret will reward you. Think of other types of prayers and the changes that God makes in you as you pray them.

FASTING

The idea of fasting scares a lot of people—the immediate thought is 48 hours of only water. But really fasting is about how our bodily needs and desires lead us away from God. So fasting can prevent us from sins of gluttony, but also lust and sloth. You can fast from anything bodily because your body effects your soul.

Freaking out about the Corona virus? Imagining it is some way the world is going to end and you'll suffer a wretched death from a God who desires to bring calamity on the earth? Fast from the 24 news cycle. Fast from your couch/ tablet/phone addiction by going for a walk and getting better sleep. (Yes, God desires that you be healthy productive for the good of neighbor. Founder of Methodism John Wesley suggested fasting twice week. And even then, it was not a total fast. iust ate less He Remember when they said you days. should eat six small meals a day. turned out to be wrong. Constantly grazing means your insulin is always Dieticians now advocate all running. your calories be taken in during an eight They call it a 16 hour hour window. fast. (Personally, I think it's pretty funny that God would design us so that something we think is going to hurt is actually good for us.)

The overall point is that the Lenten disciplines are means to an end. cause us to self-reflect on how we conduct ourselves with God, our neighbor, and His creation. I urge you to practice these disciplines. Don't think you need to do each intensely for 40 days. Maybe try each for 10 days and in the last 10 days of Lent, go back to the one that helped you indeed self-reflect. Maybe practice a three day cycle of almsgiving, prayer and fasting.

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



March 1 George Herbert Hymnwriter (1593-1633)

A Welshman by birth and an educated young man of many talents, George Herbert seemed destined for a position of influence, perhaps as a diplomat, since he was fluent in six languages. After his patron, King James the First, died, Herbert returned to his original intention of becoming a priest. He earned great respect in his vocation. After his death, his sincere, inventive religious poetry gained him an even broader hearing. poems and the hymns fashioned from them (see ELW 816, "Come, My Way, My Truth, My Life"), plus several prose writings, still speak his message long after the end of his earthly life.

March 22 Jonathan Edwards Teacher, missionary to American Indians (1703-1758)

A brilliant thinker and powerful preacher, Jonathan Edwards studied for the ministry after graduating from Yale at age seventeen. Although his Puritan-inspired writings about God's wrath are often cited in textbooks, he also spoke ardently about the grandeur of God's love and grace. A disagreement with his Massachusetts congregation about who should partake of

Holy Communion resulted in Edwards' dismissal from that pastorate. It was then that he embarked on missionary work among Native Americans in western Massachusetts, coupled with extensive writing projects. In 1757 Edwards was elected president of what is now Princeton University. He died of smallpox a few months later.

March 29 Hans Nielsen Hauge Renewer of the church (1771-1824)

After an intense mystical experience at age twenty-five, Hans Hauge, a farmer's son, was convinced that he should rouse his fellow Norwegians to a new awareness of God's salvation. At that time in Norway. itinerant preaching was illegal, but Hauge, a layperson, took his message all across the country from 1797 to 1804. He was frequently arrested, jailed, and fined, but he gathered guite a following. After a lengthy prison term and considerable personal hardship, Hauge stopped his travels and settled on a farm near Oslo to write. In later life, he gained the respect of many church leaders. One of Hauge's central ideas is the very Lutheran belief in vocation as a form of service to God. And, although he often disputed with the official church of Norway, Hauge never advocated separation from it.
