Grace and Peace to you from God our Father and our Risen Lord Jesus Christ!

As I write this newsletter article, Easter has not yet quite arrived. Nor Good Friday. Nor Maundy Thursday. Not even Palm Sunday. So it runs the danger of being outdated quickly. We will see.

The big news around here is that ON Palm Sunday, we return to in-person worship after over a two month hiatus. It feels like we are moving back towards normalcy, but we are obviously not there yet. Though we will gather and worship together, COVID protocols will still be in place (see back cover). So while we still will not be operating in a way that most of us would consider "normal", we will perhaps be "normal-er".

In my opinion, the only thing I can compare the COVID crisis to is 9/11. After 9/11, the expression "9/11 changed everything" was often proclaimed. It was true. But the new norms that came into place post-9/11 have been with us so long that they do not feel new. Nor is it easy to remember what norms left us and never came back. So it will be with a post-COVID world. Things will change—some without our noticing and some will change so greatly and be forever difficult to accept.

I expect online church will be one of those things. Our sacramental theology will not allow us to become 100% online. Baptisms by definition require real water and a real gathering of the community of believers. Bread and wine becoming the body and blood of Christ happens as that community gathers—consecration of the elements does not happen by magic. Miraculous? Yes. Mysterious? Yes. But COMMUMION does not happen among 75 people watching their respective computer springs—each holding some beverage and favorite bread-like product. Just think about the very word itself—**COMMUNION**.

2021 COMMUNITY PROJECT

But given the nature of online church, some things will have to change. And change forever. For example, I recently got an email from a church member wondering about announcements regarding individuals and their personal health issues. It has always been a sticky wicket. Some people consider some of these things personal and would not want a public announcement about an upcoming or recent surgery made in the chancel, much less broadcast on Facebook or YouTube. The only solution I can think is that Ι will simply have stop making anv announcements regarding individuals of any kind. Creating a system where there are tiers of information among those that participate in the life of a church community whether online or in-person is something that seems like a bad idea.

What's that mean for you? It means that if you—as an individual--want to find something out about a fellow member's health, you will have to ask someone close to that person. It's perfectly fine to be concerned about sister's or brother's well being, but use the phone or have that discussion in the narthex.

That's only thing minor thing that will change. There will be thousands more that we cannot foresee. Some changes won't bother you in the slightest. Some you will become used to. Others will forever irritate you. What can I tell you? I don't know. COVID changed everything.

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COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



April 4 Benedict the African, confessor (1526-1589)

Born to African slave parents on the island of Sicily, Benedict was freed when he was still a young man. His patience and dignified manner in the face of racial taunts won the notice of a group of Franciscan They invited Benedict to join hermits. them, and he stayed with them until that group dispersed in 1564. Benedict then became a lay brother of the Franciscan priory at Palermo, where he worked as a cook. Even though he was illiterate, Benedict was revered for being а sympathetic confessor and counselor. He was eventually named superior of the priory, and he led it effectively. Canonized in 1807. Benedict is considered a patron saint of African Americans.

April 6

Lucas Cranach the Elder, artist (1472-1553)

painter of the Α great German Renaissance, Lucas Cranach was called "The Elder" to distinguish him from his son Lucas, also an artist. Cranach the Elder probably learned engraving from his father. At about thirty years of age, he began painting portraits. In 1504 Cranach became court painter to Frederick III in Wittenberg, and he and Martin Luther became close friends there. Cranach painted portraits of Luther and other reformers, and some of his woodcuts were used to illustrate the first New Testament printed in German. Cranach's work shows the influence of other artists of his time. As a result, parts of his creative output were mistaken for theirs until three or more centuries after his death.

April 29 Catherine of Siena, theologian (1346-1380)

From girlhood on, Catherine experienced visions of Christ. She spent three years in cloistered living and then emerged to travel and do good works, even attempting to resolve conflicts of church and state through mediation much letter-writing Italian and to dignitaries. Catherine never learned to write; she dictated her letters and treatises. She was admired by the powerful and the poor The Catholic Church canonized alike. Catherine of Siena in 1461. Because she was revered in northern Europe, her feast day stayed on Lutheran calendars after the Reformation.
