Grace and Peace to you from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ!

This summer we tried to poll the congregation regarding a renewal of Christian education opportunities here at Our Saviour. We got a smattering of replies, not as many as I had personally hoped. We got the education team together and studied the responses and formulated some response. For the near term future, here is our plan.

- 1. Sunday School will not be returning soon. Even some avid participants in the previous Sunday School classes admitted that they appreciate the extra time on Sunday mornings. This shouldn't surprise us. When we tried to reboot Chat 'n' Snack at the beginning of this summer, the response was not enough to keep it going. Of course, Sunday School is NOT RULED OUT as a future reality, but for the near term, we will not attempt a reboot. There is no law to have Sunday School. In fact there was never Sunday School until the 19th century! So while certainly the Scriptures are intended to be studied, there is nowhere in the Scriptures that say it must happen 60 minutes before worship begins.
- 2. Evening Bible Study was also examined. We had a lot of success over the years with that ministry begun by Jesse Corbett. But you may not have realized this, but we are all getting older over the past 13 years. Many previous participants are not comfortable driving after dark. So it seems like a non-starter for now.



COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS August 2022

- The church's income for June and July did not fully cover expenses. We must consider reducing expenses.
- Classical Conversations has returned for the fall semester. Pastor Lance is working with some of the group's fathers to set up a gaga ball pit and tetherball (both of which the group has purchased).
- There is a marble-topped table in one of the Sunday School rooms that is dangerous. (The marble top is not securely attached to the frame.) Does anyone know where this table came from?
- We will order fewer boxes of stewardship envelopes for 2023, which means that you will have a new envelope number . Contributions will still be credited to the correct people!
- There will be a "Welcome Back" lunch after church on a Sunday in September
- Melodie Capole and Young Adults are planning a Trunk or Treat event on October 30. Melodie also wants to start Sunday School and Children's Church on the first and third of each month beginning in September.

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



September 13 John Chrysostom, Bishop of Constantinople (c. 346-407)

Raised a Christian in Antioch, John studied law and theology. His service to the church began with ordination as a deacon. In 386 he became a priest and devoted himself to preaching, at which he was very skillful. He earned the name Chrysostom (Greek for "golden mouth") and attracted a large following. However, during subsequent service as patriarch of Constantinople, John Chrysostom attempted reforms which angered powerful church officials as well as the emperor and his wife. He was ultimately removed from office and forced into exile. He died during an exhausting journey in severe weather. John is revered as one of the key figures of the early church.

September 16 Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, martyr (c. 200 - c. 258)

A native of North Africa, Cyprian became a Christian at age forty-six, was ordained a priest, and became the bishop at Carthage soon after that. He had to care for his fellow Christians in covert ways because of persecution by imperial authorities. Cyprian believed strongly in the need for unity in the church, so he urged compassion for those Christians who had compromised their faith under pressure from Rome. When Cyprian was asked to renounce his own Christianity, his refusal led to his beheading.

September 18 Dag Hammarskjöld, renewer of society (1905-1961)

Swedish statesman and international peacemaker, Dag Hammarskjöld began his career as a teacher before entering civil service. He as an astute financial expert whose influence extended beyond Sweden's borders following World War II. Two years after joining his country's delegation to the United Nations, he second became the UN's secretarygeneral. He was instrumental in bringing peaceful ends to conflicts in the Middle East in the 1950s. In 1961, while on a peace mission to the Congo, Hammarskjöld was killed in a plane crash. He was posthumously awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for that year. The depth of his spiritual life and devotion is evident in the book called *Markings*, based on his diaries.

Some 121 delegates, speakers, and visitors attended the two-day event which included workshops, ingathering offering, shopping, and business. Elections were held for Vice President, Secretary, and several board members. Amanda Boatwright was re-elected to serve as V-P, Shari Donley as the new Secretary and the following were elected/re-elected to serve on the board: Diane Wicker, Cindy McManus, Linda Roland, and Denise Warren. All of the board members along with speakers are outlined in the Vice President's Report in the SCWELCA newsletter along with contact information.
