"I wonder what Pastor Lance does these days?"

If you have been getting your Grapevine issues over the past few months, you should know that. But a second question is—is it worth is it?

Well, let's look at some numbers. For a few decades, the media and academy around the church has been pretty dim on the notion of numbers. They have said things like "American churches are too focused on the number of rumps they are putting in the pews and how many bucks are going in the offering plate. They OUGHT to be focusing on _____!" You can fill in the blank with a thousand different things—social justice, discipleship, you name it.

But I'll disagree. As Pastor Mel from the bishop's office told a bunch of us seminarians heading out to calls. "Numbers ARE important. So important that God named a book of the Bible after them!" Cute, but also true. Numbers aren't the be all, end all. But they tell us important things. Would you be impressed if the name of the story" was Jesus feeds a bunch of people" rather than "Jesus feeds the 5000"? Why does Luke write that after Peter preached three thousand were baptized (Acts 2) and that about 5000 came to believe some time later (Acts 4)? Numbers are important in telling a story.

MEET EMILY SAVAGE, DIRECTOR OF CLASSICAL CONVERSATIONS



We sat down with Mrs. Emily Savage to find out more about Classical Conversations, one of our partners in ministry, and what makes her tick.

GV: What drew you to the Classical Conversations program in general?

ES: What makes Classical Conversations, CC, unique is that it combines a Christian worldview with a traditional classical education. Families in our community come from many Christian backgrounds -- Baptist, Presbyterian, military, international, LDS -but we are all united under the banner of the body of Christ. Kids at our community, ages 4k-6th grade, are led by parent volunteers in memorizing God's truths about history, geography, science, English, Latin, math, while having biblical discussions. We are currently focusing on the American Revolution and Human Anatomy. Next time you meet a CC student, ask them to perform a portion of "the timeline song" and you'll be blown away by their firm grasp on human history!

For me personally, CC adds just the right balance of structure and flexibility to our homeschool routine. Though we choose to

spend a lot of time at home reading good books and caring for our goats and chickens, many students in our community are busy with sports or travel. Either way, children get the flexibility to be kids while receiving a top notch education which will prepare them to be good stewards of their community, faith. family, and further rigorous education. But what I love most about CC is the families in our community. The parents quickly become as close friends as the students in our classrooms while we labor side-by-side to raise children unto the Lord.

GV: What has been a challenge in your new role?

ES: COVID threw a lot of unexpected wrenches into the whole process! We are just grateful to be able to meet in person at a WONDERFUL location. We couldn't be more grateful for OSLC!

GV: What has been a surprise in your new role?

ES: I have been blown away by the willingness of parents to step up and volunteer. We have 8 classrooms, 1 nursery, and an afternoon play-school. That's a lot of jobs to fill! But Wednesdays continue to be our favorite day of the week because everyone pitches in to lead lessons, tidy up crafts, take out the trash, make the coffee, disinfect surfaces, and care for younger children. Homeschooling is a demanding job, but having a community of like-minded Christians makes all the difference.

GV: Tell us a little about yourself.

ES: I am a mother of four children, ages 4-10. I studied Mechanical Engineering at the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana. My husband, Jeff, is a business professor at the Darla Moore School of Business at USC. We have lived in Lexington for 4 years, and though our extended families all live out west, we hope to make South Carolina our forever home! Jeff and I were raised in Christian homes where we learned to love the Lord at a tender age. We joined CC in 2017 and I became director in 2020. So let us consider the story of this congregation and how it touches the hearts and minds of people in our proclamation of the Good News. And let's roll the clocks back to this time last year in 2019 or even 2018.

Avg Worship attendance per week = 60 Avg Bible Study attendance per week= 12

Now let us say (even though we know there is some overlap in the actual people) that those events are called "touches". So this congregation was making an average of 72 touches per week.

Now let's come up to date. September of 2020—yikes, the COVID Crisis Era!

- Avg Worship attendance = 35 per week
- Avg number of listeners to PL's sermon on Soundcloud = 12 per week
- Avg number of people watching OSLC's worship (live or recorded) = 33 per week
- Avg number watching Daily Prayer with Pastor Lance = 100 per week (5 days, ~20 per day)

That is a number of weekly touches that totals 180. And that...is an increase of 150% in just 6 months. That is enormous. A 150% increase in six months means that—right about the time of Holy Week 2021—we would (could? will? be making 450 touches a week!

Is this the work of the Kingdom of God? Maybe. I remember some guy telling his disciples about the Kingdom of God being like a mustard seed.

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



October 4 Francis of Assisi, renewer of the church (1182-1226)

One of the best-known and best-loved saints, Francis was born into wealth and privilege. It was only after wartime imprisonment and subsequent illness that grew dissatisfied he with worldly ways. Francis turned to a simple life of prayer and charitable service. He attracted a group of followers who joined him in extensive travel and preaching. The pope made Francis a deacon to formally approve his ministry. The order of friars founded by Francis (Franciscans) established a branch for women, called the Poor Clares, in 1212. In 1221, these were joined by a society for laypeople, known as The Third Order

October 4 Theodor Fliedner, renewer of society (1800-1864)

Fliedner was a German pastor who revived the deaconess system there and caused it to flourish and spread to other countries, including the United States. In addition to ministry among the German congregations, deaconesses were called as nurses in public hospitals. Training schools for women teachers were an outgrowth of the deaconess movement. Schools for parish workers, a home for unwed mothers, and the first German nursery school were also products of Fliedner's devoted service in his homeland. His efforts did much to meet society's needs while also providing women with opportunities for significant service.

October 15 Teresa of Avila, teacher, renewer of the church (1515-1582)

Daughter of an old Spanish family, Teresa entered a Carmelite convent at about age twenty. She was not enthusiastic about her life there until a mystical conversion experience changed her mind. Teresa resolved to return her order to a more disciplined observance of its rules. She founded St. Joseph's Convent near Avila and then sixteen more across Spain. Her reforms spread to Carmelite monks, chiefly through the leadership of John of the Cross. Like John, Teresa left behind writings that show an interest in mystical thought, and additionally, several volumes of practical instruction and autobiography.
