COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS October 2022

- Income for the month of September was good, but we have still not made any payments toward our apportionment to the SC Synod.

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



November 11 Martin, Bishop of Tours (c. 316-397)

Martin of Tours was born into a pagan family in what is now Hungary. At age ten, he decided to study Christianity. During his time as a soldier of the Roman Empire, he found that he could not reconcile military life with his new religion. Martin left the army and joined a monastic community at Poitiers. He was consecrated Bishop of Tours in 371. He led a very active missionary life, converting many nonbelievers and founding monasteries. Martin was one of the first non-martyrs to be granted sainthood. Martin Luther was baptized on St. Martin's Day and given the saint's name as his own first name.

November 11 Søren Aabye Kierkegaard, teacher (1813-1855)

Born into a wealthy Danish Lutheran family, Søren Kierkegaard was free from the necessity of earning a living. He elected to study philosophy and theology but did not seek ordination. He wrote brilliant essays which qualify him, in many scholars' minds, as the father of existentialist philosophy and theology. Kierkegaard loved the church but accused it of being hypocritical and straying from true Christianity. Like Martin Luther, Kierkegaard did not propose a new religious system; rather, he favored correction of the existing one. November 25 Isaac Watts, hymnwriter (1674-1748)

Nonconformist minister Isaac Watts is often called the father of English hymnody. He wrote some of his best-known hymns while serving as pastor of a congregation in Mark Lane, London. Most of his hymns are based on psalms and reflect a calm, firm belief. Our ELW contains ten Watts hymns, including "Joy to the World," "O God, Our Help in Ages Past," and "Jesus Shall Reign." Isaac Watts also wrote about philosophy, astronomy, and social issues of his day.
