ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS

The adult class has been watching the TV series "The Chosen," showing episodes from Jesus' earthly ministry and focusing on the people close to him whose lives were changed forever.

Beginning in December we will take a break from this series to have four lessons based on Amy-Jill Levine's book, Light of the World - A Beginner's Guide to Advent. Dr. Levine is a professor of New Testament and Jewish studies at Vanderbilt University. She examines the biblical texts surrounding the story of Jesus' birth, the stories of Zechariah and Elizabeth, Mary, the journey to Bethlehem, and the visit from the Magi to open a conversation about connections between the Gospel stories and the Old Testament, the role of women in firstcentury Jewish culture, the importance of Mary's visitation and the revolutionary implications of her Magnificat, the census and the stable, and the star of Bethlehem and the flight to Egypt.

As you may have noticed, there has been a lot of activity around our church in the last few months. Following is a list of projects completed or ongoing for the Property Committee:

- 1. Renewed copier contract with Pollock for new copier
- 2. Rekeyed all church locks
- 3. Worked with city of West Columbia on cleaning up our water lines and flushing them to remove discolored water
- 4. Had ice machine serviced twice due to mud in water lines
- 5. Had all fire extinguishers serviced and inspected
- 6. Replacing emergency lights in sanctuary
- 7. Replaced large electrical breaker for heating and air
- 8. Replaced sanctuary heating and air along with getting a contract for servicing all the church's heating and air units
- 9. Cleaned out three storage rooms
- 10.Checking on phone system modifications
- 11. Checking on sanctuary sound system
- 12.Replaced first aid kit in hallway
- 13.Replaced batteries in heart defibrillator
- 14.Had tea and coffee machines serviced
- 15.Replacing lights on cross outside at front door
- 16. Working on getting bids for installing security cameras throughout the church
- 17. Arranged for Dominion Energy to repair the exterior lights for the parking lot
- 18. Had pot hole repaired in the parking lot
- 19. Having the parking lot sealed and restriped

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



December 3 Francis Xavier Missionary to Asia (1506-1552)

Francis Xavier has been called the Apostle of the Indies and Japan. He was born into a prosperous Spanish-Basque family and studied in Paris. In 1534 Xavier, Ignatius Loyola, and five others took vows of poverty and chastity, dedicating themselves to preaching to non-Christian peoples. These men formed the nucleus of the new Jesuit order. After his ordination, Xavier traveled to India and preached there and in Ceylon (now Sri Lanka) for seven years. In 1549 he went to Japan to set up missions. He fell ill and died before he could enter mainland China on vet another missionary journey. In all his evangelizing endeavors, Xavier's attention to local languages and customs contributed to his success in making converts, as did his efforts to train native clergy.

December 14 John of the Cross, Renewer of the church (1542-1591)

John was born into a poor family with roots in nobility. He joined a Carmelite monastery and became a priest in 1567. Because he favored stricter adherence to the rules of the order, John urged reform similar to that being undertaken with the women of the order by Teresa of Avila. His superiors had him imprisoned, but he escaped. John is remembered as a founder of the reformed Carmelites and also as a poet and Christian mystic.

December 20 Katharina von Bora Luther Renewer of the church (1499-1552)

"My lord Katie," as Martin Luther fondly called his wife, came from a family of Saxon nobles who had fallen on hard times. After her mother died, Katharina, just five years old, was sent to a cloister. She took her vows as a nun in 1515. Eight years later, however, she sought release from convent life. Her sympathy lay with the reform movement of Martin Luther, and she appealed for his help in order to flee the convent. With the help of a merchant friend of Luther's. Katharina and at least eight other nuns were smuggled out and taken to Wittenberg. After a few years of working in various households there, Katharina became the wife of Martin Luther. A local official and friend of Luther's gave them a former monastery, the Black Cloister, for their home. Within its walls and on its grounds, and on a farm they later purchased, Katharina managed the household, the garden and orchard, the farm animals, a home brewery, and whenever needed, an onsite hospital. She frequently had to feed and house the many visitors who sought out her husband. Katharina gave birth to six children during her lifetime, and she and Martin also raised four orphans. After Martin died in 1546, Katharina suffered poverty, dislocation resulting from several wars, and wartime destruction of most of the Black Cloister property. Her death occurred after a cart accident when she was moving yet again, this time to avoid the Black Katharina's legacy includes the Plaque. example she helped to set for clergy marriage and Christian family life and her strong influence on Martin Luther's ideas regarding those.
