COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



January 19 Henry, Bishop of Uppsala, Martyr (died 1156)

English by birth, Henry became Bishop of Uppsala, Sweden, in 1152. Soon after that, he traveled with the Swedish king to Finland on a mission trip. Henry, or Henrik, as he was called in Scandinavia, stayed on to develop the church. He was killed by a Finnish farmer who had been disciplined by the church. Henry's burial place became a destination for pilgrimages, and he is considered Finland's national saint.

January 26 Timothy, Titus, and Silas (First Century AD), missionaries

All three are commemorated for their association with St. Paul's ministry. Timothy traveled with Paul on his second missionary journey and was given charge of the mission at Thessalonica and Corinth. He became the first Bishop of Ephesus and was martyred. Titus accompanied Paul to Jerusalem and later preached in Corinth, Crete, and Dalmatia. Eusebius' writings designate Titus as first Bishop of Crete. Silas went with Paul on his first visit to Macedonia and Corinth. He was known for preaching with great conviction.

January 27 Lydia, Dorcas, and Phoebe (First Century AD), witnesses to the

Acts 16:11-40 recounts Lydia's story. She came from Thyatira in Asia Minor and was perhaps Jewish rather than Gentile. She was a seller of purple-dyed business that required considerable capital. Paul baptized Lydia and her household and spent time at her home with his traveling companions. Dorcas (or Tabitha), a Christian in Joppa, was known for her works of charity and her skill as a seamstress. Peter brought her back from death (see Acts 9:36-42). Phoebe was perhaps a widow, since she traveled freely and may have delivered Paul's letter to the church in Rome. She was a helper to the Christian community in Cenchreae, near Corinth, where she looked after many people (see Romans 16:1).

Action-Lydia It shall be the duty of this committee to aid and carry out the work of Christian Service in the life of our congregation. It should provide opportunities for fellowship and service of deeds that show our love of Christ and to one another. The committee will be responsible for planning and implementing the Bible Study/Retreat, coordinating the Hospitality Committee Groups, and a Service Project.

Growth/Sunshine-Cameron This circle will keep the same committee as in the past. This committee encompasses the education function of Women of the ELCA, focusing special attention on the total mission of the Church and the spiritual growth of every individual member. It specifically coordinates the Women of the ELCA Sunday, Nursery monitors, Children's Activity Bags, sending Sunshine Cards, orders Spiritual Gifts for confirmands and baptisms and the coordination and decoration of the Christmas Tree in the Fellowship Hall.
