Brent Holcomb—Organist/ Choirmaster Melodie Capole—Handbell Director As we move through the heart of summer, I've been reflecting on the rhythm of our worship life; especially those quiet, familiar moments that can slip by unnoticed. One of those is the Passing of the Peace. Some Sundays, I wonder if we rush right past one of the most radical moments in worship.

We're halfway through the service. We've heard the good news of forgiveness, listened to the word of God proclaimed... and right after we kneel and say amen to the prayers, we hear:

"The peace of Christ be with you always." And all respond: "And also with you."

Then what happens?

Since the pandemic, many of us have found new ways to share the peace: a nod, a wave, a peace sign held up with two fingers (my personal favorite for a while). These are meaningful gestures. And yet, I'd like to offer a gentle invitation:

#### Let's begin shaking hands again.

Of course, it's always caring and faithful to refrain from touch if you're feeling sick or if shaking hands isn't safe for your health. But for those who feel comfortable, I believe this simple gesture makes a real, visceral difference in our life together as a liturgical people.

It's one more way we embody our connection to each other - not just in words, but in our very bodies - as the body of Christ. There is something powerful about feeling that connection through both the spoken peace and the physical handshake.

The Passing of the Peace has always been grounded in God's transformational work through God's people. In the early Christian church, the Peace was a sacred and serious act. Before communion, believers would pause to offer forgiveness — not only to God, but to one another. It was a way of saying:

Before we come to this table, we come clean.

Before we receive the body of Christ, we remember we are the body of Christ; and sometimes, we hurt each other. So: Peace. Not just politeness. Peace as reconciliation.



#### COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS June 2025 Secretary, Charles Nicholson

- Pastor Gragg is planning to take part in a national preaching cohort sponsored by Westmont College in Santa Barbara, California. The project will last a year and will begin with a 4-day retreat at the college in September and continue with on -line and local in-person meetings. The project is intended to help pastors in their preaching to connect more authentically to their own human experience and that of their community.

It is meant to be a gift and a sign of grace, intended to move us toward each other and God. When we pass the peace, we are practicing the kind of world God dreams of, one where grace takes root in our relationships. We are training our hearts to move from conflict toward healing. We are saying whatever burdens us and gets in the way (i.e. differing opinions, doubts, worries, judgements or grudges) doesn't have the last word. Christ does. The Peace is short, but it's no small thing.

So this month, I invite you to make it a moment to contemplate. Not a longer moment, but more meaningful. Let it be a moment where you let go of something, open up to someone, or simply remember: peace doesn't come from us having it all figured out. Peace comes from Christ. And it is already yours.

#### COMMEMORATION PROFILES Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



#### July 1 John Mason Neale, Hymn translator (1818-1866)

While he was a student of classics at Cambridge University in his native England, John Neale participated in a movement for church renewal. Although he joined the priesthood, his poor health kept him from He worked serving as a parish rector. Sackville instead as warden of College. Neale's legacy to Christian worship consists of many hymn translations, most from ancient Greek and Latin sources. Fourteen of them appear in our ELW, including "O Come, O Come Emmanuel": "Good Christian Friends. Rejoice"; and "Christ is Made the Sure Foundation."

#### Catherine Winkworth, Hymn translator (1827-1878)

English-speaking congregations are indebted to Catherine Winkworth for her translations of German hymns. Her work has made a wealth of hymn texts available. Nineteen appear in our ELW, including the much-loved "Now Thank We All Our God"; "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty"; and "O Living Bread From Heaven." Miss Winkworth spent most of her life in her native England, where she was an advocate for women's rights.

#### July 6 Jan Hus, Martyr (c. 1372-1415)

Jan Hus began life in a Bohemian peasant family. After studying theology in Prague, he became a Catholic priest. Influenced by the writings of English reformer John Wycliffe, Hus began speaking against abuses in the church of his day, including the selling of indulgences, much as Martin Luther would do a century later. Hus was forbidden to preach and then excommunicated for insubordination toward the Catholic hierarchy. At the Council of Constance, he was found guilty of heresy. On July 6, 1415, Hus was burned at the stake. His followers, called the Czech Brethren, formed the nucleus of the Moravian Church.


