Generous Stewardship: God's Story, Our Story

As we enter this season of generosity and gratitude, we pause to remember that every good gift begins with God. The story of stewardship is not about what we give up, but about how God's love continues to flow through us and into the world.

This fall, Our Saviour is entering a season of reflection and celebration around God's generosity and our shared call to be faithful stewards of all that God has entrusted to us.

When the church talks about stewardship, it can sometimes sound like talk about budgets or spending plans. Those things are part of it, but they are not the whole story. The real story of stewardship is about recognizing how God's story continues to unfold through us. It is about seeing the generosity of God woven into our daily lives in ways that are both ordinary and holy.

God has poured out abundance since the beginning of creation. The story of God's abundance is not new to us. It is the heartbeat of our faith and one that Luther's writings help us understand. In Martin Luther's explanation of the First Article of the Creed, he reminds us that God provides everything we need - daily and abundantly - even when we forget to ask or be thankful. This generosity from God is simply who God is. Purely out of divine goodness and mercy, and without any merit or worthiness of ours, God gives. Stewardship is our joyful response to that goodness. It is also our participation in God's creative work of sustaining life and community.

The ways we give generously of our time, our care, and our resources are a reflection of God's own love living through us. When we share what we have, we are mirroring the character of the One who first gave everything. Our generosity becomes a living sign of God's presence in the world, an echo of divine grace in everyday life.

God keeps creating through us and through our actions. Sometimes we try to compartmentalize money and keep faith out of the conversation. Yes, money is required for the church to operate. But our relationship with money, and the power we allow it to hold over us, can easily become the real issue. God doesn't care about money itself - God cares about what we do with it. God loves, and that same love that moves God to give freely moves through our hands when we share what we have. When we pause to notice, we see it everywhere: in the meals we prepare for one another, in the time we spend listening, and in the prayers we lift for each other and the world.

Throughout this season, we will listen to one another's stories of how God's grace shows up in daily life. On Sundays, November 2 and 9, we will hear Temple Talks - short but powerful testimonies of generosity and faith from members of our congregation. These stories remind us that stewardship is deeply personal, grounded in trust and gratitude. When we tell how God has been at work in our lives, we encourage and inspire one another to live generously.

Then, on Sunday, November 16, we will gather for Celebration Sunday, the joyful culmination of our stewardship emphasis. In worship, we will offer our Estimate of Giving cards as a sign of trust in God's provision and of our shared commitment to the ministry we do together. Like the loaves and fishes, what we offer in faith is multiplied by God for the sake of the world.

After worship, we will share a congregational meal. It will be a time to give thanks for what God has done and to look with hope toward the ministry God is calling us into next.

This year's theme, "Generous Stewardship: God's Story, Our Story," reminds us that generosity always begins with God. Everything flows from God's abundant love, and through our lives and gifts, that love continues to ripple outward.

As we move through these weeks, I invite you to pray and to listen for the ways God's grace has touched your life. What story might God be writing through you? How might your gifts of time, talent, or treasure become part of God's work in the year ahead?

Keep your eyes and hearts open to the ways God and the Spirit are moving you toward generosity. Notice where you feel inspired to give and to serve. The Spirit's leading often begins in gratitude, in impulses toward compassion, and in a sense of joyful giving. Pay attention to those moments. They are signs that God's story is still unfolding through you.

Each fall, I find myself surprised by how these stories linger - the way someone's faith story becomes a spark for someone else. Together, may we enter this season with open hearts, grateful for God's abundance, and ready to join in God's unfolding story of grace among us.

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



November 23 Clement, Bishop of Rome (died c. 100)

Very little is known of Clement's life. He is thought to have been the third successor to St. Peter as leader of the church in Rome. He is known chiefly for the letter he wrote, probably in 96 A.D., to the church at Corinth. It is a model of pastoral concern for a church troubled by discord. Clement was held in such high esteem that this letter was considered Scripture by some Christians until the fourth century. It is also responsible for his designation as one of the Apostolic Fathers of the church. Tradition has it that Clement died a martyr's death.

November 23 Miguel Agustín Pro, martyr (died 1927)

Miguel Pro was a Jesuit priest in Mexico at a time when its government was very oppressive. Those who favored the overthrow of the regime accused the Catholic church of siding with the government, and priests and so parishioners were in constant danger. Pro conducted most of his ministry in private ways, concentrating on the poor and homeless. His martyrdom resulted from a false accusation that he and his two brothers had thrown a bomb at an official's Miguel Pro shouted "Viva Cristo Rey!" ("Long live Christ the King!") as he and his brothers faced death by firing squad.

November 25 Isaac Watts, hymnwriter (1674-1748)

Nonconformist minister Isaac Watts is often called the father of English hymnody. He wrote some of his best-known hymns while serving as pastor of a congregation in Mark Lane, London. Most of his hymns are based on psalms and reflect a calm, firm belief. Our ELW contains ten Watts hymns, including "Joy to the World," "Jesus Shall Reign," and "O God, Our Help in Ages Past." Isaac Watts also wrote about philosophy, astronomy, and social issues of his day.
