Dear people of Our Saviour,

Happy Advent!

Advent begins with a promise spoken into deep and honest places. Scripture tells us, "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned" (Isaiah 9:2, NIV). These words do not dismiss the darkness we know. They speak into it, naming the realness of our lives and the world we inhabit.

Advent helps us learn how to wait with hope. It is the beginning of the church year, a season shaped by longing and expectation. Advent is not simply preparation for Christmas. It is an invitation to pay attention to the God who comes toward us in the world as it truly is. In these weeks, scripture teaches us how to watch for light in honest places, how to listen for God's promise in the middle of ordinary days, and how to trust that Christ draws near long before we feel ready. The readings that follow guide us into this kind of waiting.

Week One

Jesus calls his disciples to keep awake. Advent does not begin with celebration but with attention. Christ urges us to watch for signs of God's movement in places we might overlook. Hope begins when we stay awake to the world God loves.

Week Two

John the Baptist appears in the wilderness. His voice is strong and clear. Turn toward the Lord. Prepare the way. This is not fear speaking. It is truth telling. John makes space for new life by naming what needs healing and pointing to the One who brings it.

Week Three

John speaks again, this time from a prison cell. His question, "Are you the one who is to come," sounds like the voice of someone who has carried hope for a long time. Jesus answers by pointing to what is unfolding all around him. The blind see. The poor receive good news. The kingdom is already breaking in.

Week Four

We turn to Joseph, who chooses trust in the face of uncertainty. His plans fall apart, but the angel tells him, "Do not be afraid." God is at work in ways he cannot yet see. Christ enters the world through the quiet faithfulness of ordinary people who carry the promise forward.

Through all of these readings runs a thread that is easy to miss if we move too quickly. Isaiah speaks of people who walk in darkness, not people who have escaped it. John cries out from the wilderness, a place without clear paths or bright direction. Joseph receives his calling in a moment when his plans have collapsed and his future feels unclear. In each of these stories, the darkness itself becomes the place where God speaks. In her book Learning to Walk in the Dark, Barbara Brown Taylor describes trusting that God is often most present when our own vision is limited. Advent teaches us that the light of Christ does not wait for us to find our way. It meets us in the shadows and reveals a world God is already redeeming.

Invitations to Wonder

- Where do you notice even a small light rising in your life
- What part of your life feels like a wilderness
- Where have you heard a quiet voice of hope in the past week
- What signs of God's kingdom are appearing around you in small or ordinary ways
- How might Joseph's story encourage you to trust God's presence in a place that feels uncertain
- Where might God be teaching you to see differently, not in spite of the darkness but within it
- What do you find yourself longing for as Christ draws near

Let us now be guided by Christ as we light our Advent wreath, week by week, candle by candle. May this season open your eyes and your heart to the God who comes close.

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



December 3 Francis Xavier, missionary to Asia (1506-1552)

Francis Xavier has been called the Apostle of the Indies and Japan. He was born into a prosperous Spanish-Basque family and studied in Paris. In 1534 Xavier, Ignatius Loyola, and five others took vows of poverty and chastity, dedicating themselves to preaching to non-Christian peoples. These men formed the nucleus of the new Jesuit order. After his ordination, Xavier traveled to India and preached there and in Ceylon (now called Sri Lanka) for seven years. In 1549 he went to Japan to set up missions. He fell ill and died before he could enter mainland China on yet another missionary journey. In all his evangelizing endeavors, Xavier's attention to local languages and customs contributed to his success in making converts, as did his efforts to train native clergy.

December 7 Ambrose, Bishop of Milan (c. 339-397)

Son of a Roman official, Ambrose began his professional life in government. steadiness, modesty, and skill in public speaking made him popular with his subjects. When the local Christian bishop died in 374, the people of Milan requested Ambrose as his successor. Even though he was only a catechumen at the time, Ambrose agreed; his baptism, ordination, and consecration (on December 7) soon followed. As bishop, Ambrose heresies as well as a flood of recent converts needing instruction. He was a skillful preacher, teacher, and hymn writer (see ELW 263, 559, 571) and possibly the author of the Athanasian Creed.

December 14 John of the Cross, renewer of the church (1542-1591)

John was born into a poor family with roots in nobility. He joined a Carmelite monastery and became a priest in 1567. Because he favored stricter adherence to the rules of the order, John urged reform similar to that being undertaken with the women of the order by Teresa of Avila. His superiors had him imprisoned, but he escaped. John is remembered as a founder of the reformed Carmelites and also as a poet and Christian mystic.


